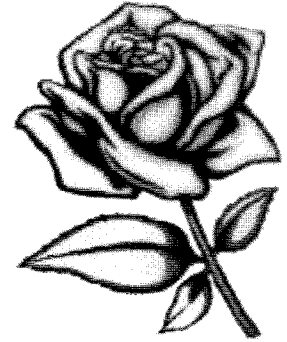

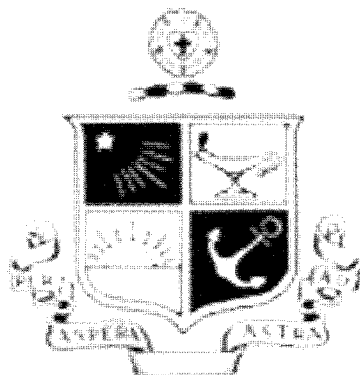

# President's Corner

## Kirk Meyer, 25th National President

The 2000-2001 school year was definitely a mixed bag. There were a lot of pains with the moving of the office and changeover in leadership, but the new office is in an excellent location and now functioning well. We chartered two new chapters last year, Omega and Alpha-Alpha, which were certainly joyous occasions for the individuals who made them happen and for Beta Sigma Psi as a whole.

Unfortunately our overall membership numbers dipped slightly again last year,

with a few chapters finding themselves in serious numbers trouble. Chapter awards applications again were almost non-existent, with only two of the five chapter awards given out, and only two applicants for the Erck

Award. This year's recipients are Zeta Chapter, the Edwards Award; Alpha Chapter, the Hingst Award; Dane Kohrs of Zeta and Steve Meyer of Alpha, the Erck Award; Thurman "Doc" Kaiser of Beta Chapter, the Tiemann Award; Jim Gwinner of Iota, Steve Hollrah of Pi, and Mike Dove of Zeta, the Alumni Volunteer Service Award.

We had an incredible turnout at the Membership Education Forum/National Basketball Tournament in February (with Epsilon Chapter winning the tournament), but had to cancel the Leadership Academy and National Council meeting in August due to lack of interest. Communications from and to the National level were down, but we hope to make a major improvement on that this year. On a final review note for this past year, we were able to finish the fiscal year with a fairly sizeable "profit", which the Board decided to use toward paying down the \$40,000+ loan owed to the Beta Sigma Psi (Housing) Foundation.

The National Headquarters Office will remain in Belleville this year, where it has been since October of last year. We are thrilled to have Joy Hayward continuing as the National Office Administrator, which is a major plus. Since she has weathered

half a school year and been through most of the procedures of the office now, Joy should be able to run things much more smoothly this year.

### Looking Forward, Challenges Ahead

Plans for the next MEF/NBT are underway with Iota hosting the event. Chad Pfister is in charge of planning at Iota, and you can reach him at [cnpcdb@mizzou.edu](mailto:cnpcdb@mizzou.edu) or 573-808-6030.

And while you're marking your calendars for the MEF/NBT, be sure to mark your calendars for the 2002 National Convention in Kansas City. It will be held August 8-11, and more details will be available in January. National conven-

tions are great events to see new places and meet all kinds of alumni from around the country and all eras from the 1940's to present. It's an experience you won't forget. Alumni Relations VP Jim Shildmyer is heading up the planning of the event, and you may contact him with any questions.

There are four committees which were formed at the 2000 convention which have not yet completed their assignments and could use additional members to do so. The committees are Constitutional Review, National Scholarship, Transportation Expenses/Arrangements, and Ritual Equipment. Committee members can be actives or alumni, but there should be only one person from each chapter on each committee. If you are interested in serving on one of these committees, please send your contact information to the National Office and which committee you are interested in serving on.

There are plans to continue our public relations/name recognition efforts at the national level. One of them is to send a poster/flyer to each Lutheran church in each state we have a chapter. There have also been discussions of making presentations at the seminaries in St. Louis and Ft. Wayne, since we have very close alumni

connections with both of them. We hope to be able to make that happen during this school year.

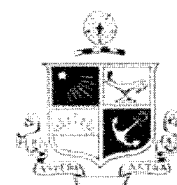
I can't emphasize and encourage enough how important it is for alumni to remain involved with the active chapters – your own or one which may be close to you. We had one chapter accused of hazing again this year, which shows that our chapter membership programs are still in need of reform. We also still have some chapters struggling with maintaining our Lutheran heritage as our founders intended. The input and influence of alumni on a frequent, positive, and constructive basis can greatly help to eliminate these problems. Of course, recruitment assistance is another area which cannot be underestimated or underused. None of our chapters are at capacity and some aren't even half-full. Please keep in contact with pastors in your area to help find potential members.

Although it had some delays and complications, the recently produced National directory seems to have been very well received. Approximately 1,800 members responded to the address update requests by the publisher, University Publishing, and they were sent a copy of the completed directory. The publisher did most of the setup work on the directory with final edits by 24th National President Craig Varner.

The project was paid for entirely by donations received from responding members, and a few thousand dollars in surplus over the cost has been given to the National Fraternity. We thank everyone who participated in the project and sent in donations! Hopefully we can do another one in a couple years, with even greater participation.

# 2001 National Awards

The Awards Committee is chaired by George Keiser, alumnus from Iota Chapter and assisted by Rod Thompson, alumnus from Epsilon. Alumni serving on this year's awards committee for the National Convention included Warren Pflantz from Iota and Cliff Ascher from Zeta.

The Governor Norbert T. Tiemann Award is presented to alumni who have distinguished themselves in their chosen profession over a lifetime of achievement. Appropriately, it was first given to Governor Norbert T. Tiemann, an alumnus of Delta Chapter, who served as the Governor for the State of Nebraska. The award is given for "a lifetime of exceptional accomplishment in professional endeavors." This year's recipient is Thurman W. "Doc" Kaiser, an alumnus of Beta Chapter. An article describing Doc's professional accomplishments is included elsewhere in this edition of the Gold Rose.

The Erck Award is presented each year to the outstanding active member of Beta Sigma Psi. The award is named for the late Reverend Erck, longtime Pastoral Advisor to Delta Chapter. The award includes the following wording: "A distinguished leader in church, fraternity, campus and community affairs, demonstrated in assuming leadership, sharing responsibilities, teaching, supporting, caring, and giving of himself while achieving academic excellence." The 2001 Erck Award recipients included Stephen A. Meyer of Alpha Chapter and Dane A. Kohrs from Zeta Chapter.

The Hingst Award is presented annually to the active chapter or colony that exhibits the top scholastic achievement in the National Fraternity. The award is named for W. John Hingst, an alumnus from Beta Chapter, who served as the National President from 1952 to 1967. Nominations were received from Zeta and Alpha Chapters. The 2001 Hingst Award

was presented to Alpha Chapter.

The Edwards Award is presented annually to the active chapter or colony exhibiting the best overall management. The award is named for Larry Edwards, an alumnus of Zeta Chapter, who served as National President from 1967 to 1972. This year's recipient of the Edwards Award is Zeta Chapter.

The Welge Award is presented annually to the active chapter or colony deemed to have the best recruitment program. The award is named for William H. Welge. An alumnus of Alpha Chapter, Brother Welge was one of the Founding Fathers of Beta Sigma Psi and served as National President from 1936 to 1938. The 2001 Welge Award was not presented.

The Baehr Award is given annually to the active chapter producing and displaying the best chapter or colony scrapbook. The award is named for William Baehr, a former Kansas State University Professor of Library Sciences and National Historian, who realized the importance of preserving chapter histories. The scrapbook is useful for a rush tool. There were no nominations received for the 2001 Baehr Award.

The Founder's Cup is presented annually to the active chapter or colony deemed to have the best membership education program. The traveling trophy is over 30 inches in height, and is awarded to the active chapter or colony that provides scholarship, religious, leadership, personal and social skill development programs and activities for active and associate members alike which add to the educational value of chapter life. The 2001 Founder's Cup was not presented.

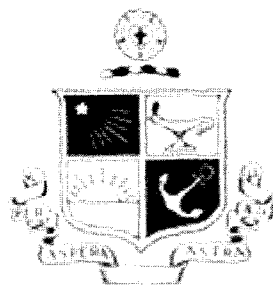
The Luther Award is presented each year to a person devoting service to the Lutheran Church. This prestigious award

is presented to any pastor, church official or other distinguished member of the Lutheran community for devoted service to the Lutheran Church and spiritual leadership provided to Beta Sigma Psi. There were no nominations for the 2001 Luther Award.

The Junker Georg (yoong ker' gay'ord) Award is named for Martin Luther who hid and wrote under that name during the war - rant for his arrest from the Vatican (he signed his writings Knight George, or in German, Junker Georg). This award is presented to the Beta Sigma Psi brother (either active or alumnus) most responsible for starting a new colony of Beta Sigma Psi. The award is presented as part of the colony's chartering ceremony. We did not have any colonies this past year and therefore the award was not eligible for presentation.

The Alumni Volunteer Service Award is designed to recognize those alumni that contribute substantially to our fraternity over the course of the school year. The award is presented to alumni who significantly impact a collegiate chapter or colony, alumni chapter, national committee, or national board; be significant in nature and produce tangible results; reflect favorably on the alumnus' chapter and Beta Sigma Psi; and be of sustained and direct nature. The 2001 Alumni Volunteer Service Awards (with the citations included) were awarded to:

Michael R. Dove from Zeta Chapter Mike serves as the Alumni President of the Manhattan Alumni Chapter. Mike has served the Manhattan Alumni in many capacities over the years, to include President in 1980, 2000 and 2001; Vice-President in 1981, 1998 and 1999; and Secretary in 1974, 1975, and 1976. Recently, Mike was a member of the Zeta Chapter's 50th Anniversary Committee which was an extremely successful and enjoyable event. The AVSA recognizes Mike's dedication and volunteer service to Zeta Chapter, the Manhattan Alumni and to Beta Sigma Psi.

# Kaiser Wins Tiemann Award

The Governor Norbert T. Tiemann Award is presented to alumni who have distinguished themselves in their chosen profession over a lifetime of achievement. Appropriately, it was first given to Governor Norbert T. Tiemann, an alumnus of Delta Chapter, who served as the Governor for the State of Nebraska. The award is given for "a lifetime of exceptional accomplishment in professional endeavors." Nominations for the Tiemann Award should be timed to honor the candidate at the conclusion of their professional career. This year's recipient is Thurman W. "Doc" Kaiser, an alumnus of Beta Chapter.

Doc graduated from Concordia Lutheran High School, Fort Wayne, Indiana in 1945 and was a Valedictorian of his class. He enlisted in the U. S. Army Air Corps Air Cadets in 1944 and served from June through December 1945 in the United States; and in France and Germany from December 1945 to October 1946. Doc went to Purdue University and graduated with a BSChE in 1950. He served as Beta Chapter President and Rush Chairman. He was inducted into Tau Beta Pi and Omega Chi Epsilon engineering honoraries.

Doc has served Beta Sigma Psi as the National Publications Director from 1952 – 1954 and was a delegate to the National Interfraternity Council from 1952 – 1955. Doc was the Distinguished Alumni Speaker for the 2000 Educational

Foundation Membership Education Forum hosted by Chi Chapter. Doc has supported and contributed greatly to Beta Chapter for many, many years. He is a member of Concordia Lutheran Church in Wilmington, Delaware and has served as the Public Relations and Newsletter Editor of Lutheran Community Services in Wilmington from 1988 – 1994. Over the years he has served in various capacities on church councils in three states.

The following are highlights and milestones from a very distinguished business career:

□ 1950: Joined E. I. DuPont de Nemours & Company, Inc.

□ 1950 – 1960: Engineer and supervisor in process research and development on tetraethyl lead and fluorocarbons. Developed system for handling molten metal at 400 PSI and 800 degrees F.

□ 1960 – 1962: Division Head, Jackson Laboratory, Deepwater, New Jersey Intermediates research and development. Developed continuous process for nitrochlorobenzenes, nitrosodium phenolate, dichloroaniline and toluidine.

□ 1962 – 1964: Assistant Marketing Manager for refrigerants, Freon Products Division. Introduced Freon 502 as a low temperature refrigerant.

□ 1964 – 1968: Regional Manager, Freon Products Division.

□ 1968 – 1974: Marketing Manger,

Freon Products Division and Petroleum Chemicals Division.

□ 1974 – 1977: Manufacturing and Production Manger, Intermediates Division, Chambers Works, Deepwater, New Jersey and Wilmington, Delaware.

□ 1977 – 1985: Marketing and Business Manager, Intermediates Division. Responsible for world marketing of 150 products and \$200 million in revenue.

□ 1985 – 1987: Global Business Director, Intermediates and Petroleum Chemicals. Responsible for production and marketing of \$350 million in revenue of products for synthetic fibers, agricultural chemicals, dyes, pharmaceutical and petroleum refining industries.

□ 1987: Retired from DuPont.

□ 1988 – 1991: President, Kennett Consulting, Inc. Consulted on global marketing and strategy for chemical firms in the United States and Europe.

We congratulate a lifetime of professional achievement in presenting the Tiemann Award to Doc Kaiser. Our hope in presenting our distinguished alumni with the Tiemann Award is to demonstrate for our collegiate members that with hard work, dedication and God's blessings a lifetime of accomplishment and professional enjoyment is possible and attainable.

## Dr. Larry Erickson Receives Award

Dr. Larry Erickson (Zeta 1958), Professor in the Department of Chemical Engineering at Kansas State University and long-time advisor to Zeta Chapter was awarded the Irvin Youngberg Award at the Adams Alumni Centers on the Campus of the University of Kansas. The Youngberg Award is given to one of four persons each year to recognize outstanding research achievement. The award was established in 1981 by Takeru and Aya Higuchi to recognize research accomplishments of faculty at Kansas Board of Regents institutions. Higuchi was a distinguished professor of Chemistry and Pharmacy and chairman of the Department of Pharmaceutical Chemistry at the University of Kansas.

The awards are named for four graduates from the University of Kansas to honor them for their contributions to the entire research program at the University.

Dr. Erickson was recognized for his research achievement and leadership in the field of hazardous substances. He received his Ph.D from Kansas State University and became a full professor after only eight years on the KSU faculty. In his 36 years of service, he has coauthored more than 330 papers and six books covering a wide range of topics and consulted with numerous international industrial clients and academic institutions.

Dr. Erickson serves as director of the Center for Hazardous Substance Research at KSU. The center's selection as one of only five national EPA Centers for hazardous substance research is a testimony to his ability as a director. Significant advances in the remediation of contaminated soil have resulted in cost savings at many field sites including sites in Kansas.

# It's Time to Grow Again

In putting together this edition of the Gold Rose, I spent considerable time formatting our donor list. The number and generosity of our alumni donors are a crucial source of funds in keeping the fraternity operating at top quality levels, and we are truly blessed each and every year as alumni continue to support the Lutheran mission of Beta Sigma Psi.

As a National Fraternity, we provide a level of undergraduate development on par with fraternities many times our size. We promote an active and up-to-date new member program. We provide active members the opportunity to attend national development seminars on leadership. We bring together undergraduates and alumni annually for education and fellowship through the Membership Education Forum, National Basketball Tournament, Leadership Academy and the bi-annual National Council Meeting.

All of these programs make Beta Sigma Psi a tremendous value in the growth of more than 200 college men every year. But that number is a fraction of what it could be. Looking at the chapters listed, we have donors from 20 of our 25 historical chapters, including 14 that have since closed and four too new to have an alumni base.

That is not to say that Beta Sigma Psi could or should grow to the size of the larger national fraternities, but we do have the opportunity to serve more Lutheran college men on more campuses than we do today. The question is how to get there.

Three elements must come together to create the right environment for growth: strong chapter management, an active colony base and a change in our view of the chapter.

## Growth begins at home

Expansion requires a strong, stable base of active members to recruit a new stable of leaders every year. Chapters facing falling numbers and difficulty paying the bills need to get back on a firm foundation and on track with National initiatives such as the membership education program and Right on Target Chapter Management. These chapters also need to actively serve the Lutheran community around them to

promote the good name of Beta Sigma Psi.

Alumni chapters play an important part in this. Alumni must be present in large numbers throughout the year lending moral, logistical and financial support to the chapters. Most importantly, if an alumnus can not serve his collegiate chapter due to distance, he can be of great service to another closer chapter or in helping develop a future chapter. He can also contribute support by keeping in touch with the chapter through e-mail and letters demonstrating his interest and support.

Solid, well-managed active and alumni chapters create the foundation and worry-free environment that allows the National Fraternity to commit its resources to the intense task of establishing new colonies and leading them to chartering.

## Alumni in the field

Alumni mentors are required for growth. Every colony needs a team of committed alumni to guide the colony's formation and eventual path to chartering. Ideally, several alumni would work together in this endeavor so no one alumnus is left with the exhausting task of guiding a group of men through Fraternity 101.

Making this work requires breaking the iron lock of chapter mentality. Alumni must first identify themselves with the National Fraternity, then the collegiate chapter. Alumni who live 1,500 miles their college chapter can fill a positive and rewarding volunteer advisor role for a new colony or nearby chapter – something distance does not allow at their alma mater.

Shared with a team of fellow alumni, supporting a colony can be an invigorating challenge bringing together alumni to share the Beta Sig experience long after college rehashing old memories and creating new stories of challenges met and good times.

But finding men willing to commit to helping a group of college students interested in the Beta Sig experience is difficult these days. Think back to your college experience and your brothers' and how many of them said Beta Sig is the only reason they made it across the graduation stage – perhaps you can help create that

same experience for another would-be brother.

## It's Not Your Old Fraternity

Simply put, times have changed and rules have changed, but the Beta Sig experience is still just as rewarding.

For years, Beta Sig carried the notion that life revolved around a chapter house and certain traditional events. For some chapters it still does. But for many of our newer chapters, the chapter house is just a possibility at some point in the future. Today the fraternity brings together men interested in service, Lutheran identity, fellowship and a lasting legacy.

At some campuses, our chapter will never have a traditional house. On others, Beta Sig helps provide a Lutheran identity in the midst of a very secular environment.

The possibilities are boundless and the Founding Fathers provided a framework to take the benefits of Beta Sig to many groups of men. Doing so requires that we let go of old notions of what Beta Sig is supposed to be and explore what it can be in a world searching for just such a group.

Within the framework of the Beta Sig experience, we can develop new opportunities to bring college men into our ranks at many campuses and for many reasons in chapters that will be a new experience to the college and alumni members alike.

Whether you can contribute to the development of an active or metropolitan alumni chapter, the fraternity can benefit from a growing and involved membership base. I hope you will give prayerful consideration of how you can continue to support the mission of the fraternity and give young men the same great memories you have. # 2001-2002 National Operations

Below follows a summary of National operating goals for the current school year. Many of these goals reflect a continuation of the "Back to Basics" approach the National Fraternity has undertaken in the past several years to strengthen our chapter base and encourage leadership at multiple levels of the organization.

Participation at the Active, Alumni and National levels is necessary to see these goals to successful completion as well as the ongoing development of future leaders to take over as current leaders move to new and different challenges bringing fresh perspectives and energy to bear at all levels of the fraternity.

## Near-Term Operations

□ Increase collegiate membership through recruitment assistance and ongoing emphasis of proven rush strategies clearly defined in the National Recruitment Strategy. Alumni and Active involvement on the local level is necessary to achieve this step as the fraternity's resources at the National level continue to focus on global issues and select chapter issues.

Colonization plays an important part in increasing membership but requires active

support of alumni in the field.

□ Strengthen the spiritual emphasis of the fraternity through stronger communications, alumni counseling at the chapter level, and alumni involvement in recruitment and expansion. Chapters actively participating in local congregations and service to the church as a group continue to fare better than those with segmented or inconsistent involvement.

□ Increase alumni participation through the encouragement of alumni to become involved in their college chapter, a local chapter or a metropolitan alumni organization. Strong possibilities exist for alumni participation in Chicago, Kansas City, St. Louis, Denver and North Texas as well as the ongoing need for alumni willing to advise colonies.

□ Increase communication through publication of information in the Gold Rose and on the National e-mail list.

□ Emphasize total membership education based on a four-year education program rather than the old one-semester pledgship program. Membership Education Forum and Leadership Academy attendance by as many members of each chapter as possible plays an important role in this. The National Fraternity

also provides a clearly defined chapter education and management program in the Right on Target Manual provided annually to every chapter. Chapter members are also eligible for general scholarships, a summer leadership program sponsored by the NIC.

□ Recognize outstanding contributions and achievement through the awards program. Chapter adherence to Right on Target should generate award applications for every award for every chapter. Alumni should also be brought to the attention of the National Fraternity to outstanding support of the fraternity, the Lutheran Community or life-time career achievement.

## Long-Term Operations

□ Increase membership through the chartering of new chapters on campuses where interest exists including the re-chartering of closed chapters.

□ Increase services to chapters in proportion to membership/operating revenue increases.

□ Make communications at the Chapter and National levels consistent, comprehensive and high in quality throughout the year to encourage alumni involvement.

## Luther's Seal: A Refresher

*The following is from information provided by Lutheran Brotherhood and edited by Pastor Hugh Holm from Faith Lutheran Church, O'Fallon, IL. This was included in our church's Reformation Day bulletin and used with permission.*

The first thing expressed in the seal is a cross, within the heart; black, a reminder of death, and that there is a part of us which must each die daily. But it also reminds me that faith in Christ crucified saves us. "For with the heart one believes unto righteousness." Because of our baptism into Christ, we are forgiven and free from fear of death and the devil. The cross, although black, mortified, and intended to cause pain, does not change the color of the heart; it does not destroy nature – i.e. does not kill, but rather keeps alive – "For the just shall live by Faith."

Around the cross is the red Heart, to show that our response to the cross of Christ is Faith. We are Free! Our sinfulness is forgiven! Our hearts wrap themselves around the cross. We hear the good news of God's promise: "For the sake of Jesus Christ,

your sins are forgiven," and we believe, initiating a faith active in love.

The heart is fixed upon the center of a white rose, to show that faith causes joy, consolation and peace. The rose is white, not red, because it is from the Messiah, and is also the color of angels and blessed spirits.

This rose, moreover is fixed in a blue sky-colored field, to denote that such joy of faith given by the Holy Spirit is but an earnest and beginning of heavenly joy to come, as anticipated and held by hope, though not yet fully revealed.

And around this field of blue is a golden ring, to signify that such bliss in heaven is endless, (as is the ring) and more precious than all joys and treasures. Since gold is so treasured here on earth we are reminded that Christ, our dear Lord, will give grace unto eternal life worth more than we could hope or know. "That where I am, you also may be."

# The Richest Man in Babylon

For those of you familiar with "The Message to Garcia", you may have encountered "The Richest Man in Babylon." Written by George S. Clason and published as early as 1926, I stumbled upon this classic in the bookstore during one of my browsing sessions. These types of "preachments" were popular articles distributed by banks, insurance companies, investment houses and employers up to the 1950's. On one of my visits to Bode, Iowa my mom showed me a copy of "The Message to Garcia" neatly bound in a small leather booklet that she received from her grandmother.

In my opinion, we don't bring the lesson of financial planning to our actives and associates often enough. I believe that is why the book "Rich Dad, Poor Dad" has been so successful, although I haven't had time to get to that one yet but hope to do so soon.

The text starts out by introducing the reader to "The Man Who Desired Gold". Bansir, a chariot builder, met his bills but always was without shekels and had an empty purse. He encounters his friend Kobb, who is looking for a handout of money to afford dinner. After discussing their plight for a short time, they are determined to meet with one of their old friends, Arkad, who became the richest man in Babylon.

In the next chapter we are told Arkad's story. He worked as a scribe making clay tablets. He encounters Algamish, the moneylender, and strikes a deal with him involving some overtime work. In return, Algamish tells Arkad how he may also become rich. Algamish's experience was "...to find the road to wealth you must decide that a part of all you earn is yours to keep. It should not be less than a tenth no matter how little you earn. Pay yourself first. Do not buy from the clothes maker and the sandal maker more than you can pay out of the rest and still have enough for food and charity."

The book is written in a style that attempts to place the reader in the golden age of Babylon. Once you get over the 'thy and thou' of

days gone by, the reading journey is interesting. The next chapter is "Seven Cures for a Lean Purse" and include:

□ Start thy purse to fattening. Start a savings plan. The author recommends putting aside one tenth of your earnings and letting your earnings earn for you in interest.

□ Control thy expenditures. Use a budget to plan for your needs. Don't buy what isn't in the budget.

□ Make thy gold multiply. Put your earnings to work in safe and wise investments.

□ Guard thy treasures from loss. Don't invest in get rich quick schemes.

□ Make of thy dwelling a profitable investment. It is wise to purchase your home with a mortgage in most cases than to continue to pay rent.

□ Insure a future income. Prepare a will and plan for your retirement.

□ Increase thy ability to earn. You must have the desire to succeed and study to become wiser.

In the chapter "Meet the Goddess of Good Luck" the author warns against gambling away your earnings. The author provides some detailed advice in the chapter "The Five Laws of Gold". Other chapters build on the author's ideas to build wealth over the course of a lifetime.

I hope you enjoyed this article and perhaps you will consider reviewing "The Richest Man in Babylon" yourself. For about \$12 the book reasonably priced and only about 160 pages long. We should encourage many discussions about wealth planning for our actives and associates and also with our family members. A good place to start is with your Lutheran Brotherhood or AAL representative, or another financial planner you trust.
