



Iowa State University's Interfraternity Council honored Epsilon Chapter of Beta Sigma Psi for committing the most number of hours of service of the whole ISU Greek community for the Spring 2004 semester.

Out of a total of 29 fraternities at the ISU campus, Beta Sig topped with list with a total of 617 volunteer hours out of a total of 5,112 hours of committed campus wide.

Major time was committed to ushering at Memorial Lutheran Church each Sunday, cleaning up the stadium after home football games with the Salt Company campus ministry, painting a nursery at Camp Riverside (a Lutheran retreat center), and playing with kids at the Boys and Girls Club. Members also volunteered with the Salvation Army, United Way, Story County Conservation, Cub Scout Troop 196, Jesus' Right Hand, and Habitat for Humanity, among other organizations.

On November 30, 42 players participated in the chapter's euchre tournament. Through entry fees and company sponsorship, Epsilon raised \$300 to help Lord of Life Lutheran Church purchase a wheelchair lift for 7-year old member Kyra Harbacheck.

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
From The Director: Beta Sigs For Life

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MEF Speaker Stresses Recruitment, Lutheran Identity Key To Fraternity

National Fraternity Meets For Annual Membership Education Forum By Layton Ehmke, Zeta Chapter Active Member

he growth and success of Beta Sigma Psi germinates from Luthern identity and the builidng of a strong recruitment program, said Vaughn Studer, keynote speaker at this year's Membership Education Forum held in January at First Lutheran, Manhattan, Kan.

More than 100 active Beta Sigs from across the nation gathered together to learn how improve their local chapter and to listen to Studer's advice on chapter growth.

Studer, of the Foundation KSU Local Agency at Kansas State University, delivered a strong message focused primarily on recruitment at this year's MEF. Studer, also a Zeta Chapter alumnus, detailed recruitment as a step-by-step process and stressed the importance of maintaining the Beta Sig Lutheran identity, something that sets it apart from every other fraternity at every campus.

"Being Lutheran is who we are, it's why we were founded, it is why we exist. The minute we move away from our core heritage, we will lose who we are. We can't, nor do we want to be, a 'me-to, generic' social fraternity like so many of the others. The Lutheran requirement promotes diversity in that many new mem-

bers get away from their high school friends and develop their own identity within Beta Sig," Vaughn Studer said.

Matt Wolters, director of the national fraternity agreed.

"Having an identity is critical. We are the National Lutheran Fraternity, and a social group of Lutheran men. That is who we were in 1925 and who we are today. Its awesome that we still have our unmistakable identity after 78 years," Wolters said.

He said that losing that identity is a danger to the livelihood of the fraternity.

"Some fraternities have chosen the ever so popular 21st century action of releasing their identity in order to become more main stream or politically correct," Studer said. "I know members of these organizations. At the

surface it appears to be wonderful, but after a couple of years, they don't know who they are."

Wolters, who conducted the day's events, thought this year's MEF was a success, but there is hard work still ahead. "The largest challenge facing active chapters is the ability to recruit. Realizing this, I decided to focus on providing those attending with tangible skills they can use in the recruiting process. Larry Edwards, a Leinemann

Award recipient, repeatedly says, 'A chapter that is up in rush, is up in everything.' As we recruit better we will be more successful in every aspect of the fraternity." he said.


Steve Brokhoff, this year's MEF coordinator, said that learning how recruitment works is absolutely vital for every Beta Sig. This is largely due to a trend of shrinking pledge classes, not only for Beta Sigma Psi, but for all fraternities in general.

"Times are changing and all fraternities are rushing fewer guys every year. Our strength is that we've got a strong identity. We're Lutheran," he said.

Brokhoff sees the motivation that MEF sparks every year, and was pleased with the "super effort" he got from everyone.

"It is an exciting weekend. The idea this year is to lay out a lasting plan for the fraternity, and hopefully everyone will maintain that enthusiasm throughout the

Actives, Alumni Compete At Annual Beta Sigma Psi National Basketball Tournament

The tournament kicked off at 2 p.m., after an already early start to the day for the annual Membership Education Forum. By the third round, teams were getting worn down and flat-out tired. The games became less flashy, and the moves got more practical. By the fourth round, two

teams chose to give up running all together, and rightly so, for they had no chance at the title whatsoever.



Kuhlman said most guys thought the boys from Purdue, Beta chapter, were going to sweep the tourney, which they did easily and smoothly.

Chad Winterhoff, national president, said he could definitely tell that Beta chapter had it together.

"These guys have got some great teamwork and they obviously practice together quite a bit," Winterhoff said.

The championship game came up between Beta and the feared Delta alumni who go to tournaments focused, mentally

One of Our Own Experiences Life In Iraq

John Hoestje tells of his experiences while being stationed in the Middle East. John is an alumnus of Zeta chapter at Kansas State.

It has been about a year since I left the States for Operation Iraqi Freedom (OIF). I knew it was going to be hard leaving my wife, but never would have dreamed the hardships we both have gone through. The situations I have experienced here have changed my life, hopefully for the better.

After staying at Ft. Riley, Kan., for almost two months, we received a notice to get on a plane in 4 hours to fly out. I

was finally able to briefly talk to my wife on the way to the airport. It wasn't easy explaining to her what was happening



while still in shock. We landed in Kuwait during the night and were disoriented by the flight, but the adrenaline hit as we contemplated what we might be getting into. After a couple weeks of waiting for a mission, we convoyed up to the Iraqi border. I was totally unprepared for what I was to experience next. As soon as we crossed the wires, fences, and tank ditches, many very young Iraqis ran toward our vehicles begging for our MRE's (Meals Ready to Eat). Even older Iraqis stood by the side of the road ready to snatch what they could. No one had

any of us face the recruiting challenge of encouraging our son to join Beta Sigma Psi. In my failed attempt to get my son to join, I asked for help from many of our distinguished alumni.

Even though he did not join for his first year in college, my son is still considering Beta Sigma Psi next year after he has made the transition to college. I'm sharing some excerpts from these letters for other legacies who are considering Beta Sigma Psi: Rudy Herrmann wrote, "My membership in Epsilon Chapter of Beta Sigma Psi was an important aspect of my total Iowa

State experience. The leadership skills that I began to hone at Iowa State and at Beta Sigma Psi (I was Chapter President once) have served me well throughout my industrial career."

Merle Aukamp, a distinguished Alpha Chapter alumnus said, "I hope you give serious consideration to becoming a Beta Sig. It seems that my pride continues to grow each year as an alumnus of Beta Sigma Psi. There is little doubt that Christian leaders are developed through the fraternity and become positive members of our society."

Scott Gesell's advice included "fortunately,

I was lucky enough to find the Beta Sig house at the University of Nebraska. Although I did not realize it then, I know now that God was watching out for me. At the time I did not understand or appreciate that a life rooted in Christ is the only true goal of human existence. My son, who will graduate next spring, always brings me great joy. I want the best for him and I want him to experience what I did."

Greg Gesell, Scott's brother, wrote, "I also pray that you will join the Beta Sig chapter there. You will be making many of those life decisions on your own and having strong Christian brothers beside you will help you. I know in my case, it did! God bless you in all that you do."

From Larry Edwards, "We set out as associate members to make Zeta Chapter the best fraternity on campus and true to our founding principles. We did! And we each learned along the way something about leadership and selling. Perhaps that is why two of our class members were Vice Presidents of Sales & Marketing for two Fortune 100 companies.

Bill Jentzen, an Epsilon alumnus wrote, "No other living arrangement on campus will offer to you a better balance of social, scholastic and spiritual priorities than Beta Sigma Psi. I attribute many of my personal values and professional skills directly to my experiences at Beta Sigma Psi."

Bill Bunte wrote "We certainly need young men like yourself that have the potential to be one of the leaders in our fraternity in the future. In turn, I believe our fraternity has a lot to offer you; a Christian heritage and environment with the appropriate emphasis on scholarship and fraternal fellowship."

Norm Wilms' letter had the following advice: "From what

your father advised me you are a good student with some talents that would be valuable in a fraternity. A good choir director is always in demand. The fraternity also has some things it can offer to you. Managing a fraternity house requires some skills. It is a good training ground to develop skills that will be handy when you graduate from college. The fraternity can be a place to develop some skills that are not in the text books."

Ralph Folkerts words of wisdom included "Some of my closest friends are friends I made in my undergraduate and alumni service to Beta Sigma Psi. Foremost I encourage you to serious-

ly consider pledging a fraternity - the benefits are fantastic. Secondly, I hope you will give serious weighting to pledging Beta Sigma Psi. I think you would find that Beta Sig does, in fact, provide a well-rounded social, scholastic, and spiritual opportunity that you would find enriching. And the relationships you will develop will be ones you will cherish your whole life."

Doc Kaiser said, "I urge you to join Beta Sig. I do this because it is far more important than just deciding where you are going to live during college or with whom you will spend time the next four years. Joining Beta

Sig has meant so much in my life, and I am confident that it will in yours. Here it is, more than 50 years after I left school, and the closest friends I have, guys with whom I have shared triumph and deep tragedy, are the Beta Sig brothers from those days."

Tom Schlange provided the following "Ten Guidelines for College:"

- 1.Be a member of something. Sing in the church choir. Try out for a choral group. Join a fraternity. Participate in an engineering club. But don't just be a "dues payer"; be a "doer". We get out of life what we invest into it.
- 2. Vote. Wherever and whenever you are provided the opportunity to do so.'
- 3. Do something for others. Volunteer at church. Offer to translate for a new foreign student on campus. Help tutor somebody in your class who "just doesn't get it." Push some girl's car when she gets stuck in the snow. We help ourselves by helping others.
- 4. Remember you are a student. At this particular point in your life, you have been called by God to be a college student. Respect that calling. Nobody is going to make you study nobody even makes you go to class! But understand that going to college means you have a priority to be a student. Learn everything you can.
- 5. Be prepared to agree to disagree. You will meet lots of people, students and faculty alike, with different values or traditions than yourself. You can have lots of fun with your friends without imitating their actions. But always remember the key to disagree with somebody without being dis-

Special thanks go to Pastor Meyer for his efforts including presiding over the Bible studies, Pastor Steinbauer for his continued work. Also, Matt Wolters and Chad Pfister for coming up to make phone calls and meet with recruits before Spring break in March, and to Dane Kohrs and Adam Syonground for doing this after the break. Dane and Adam should also be commended for working with members of the core group on rush techniques and strategies in addition to providing enthusiasm to the rush process.

In our ongoing efforts we offering sev-

eral \$1,000 scholarships to new Beta Sig members for the school year 2004-2005. Funds have been provided by the National Education Endowment specifically for use by Delta Chapter/colony with matching funds from the Delta alumni board. We have posted the scholarships up at the Chapel and Center in addition to sending them to the 510 ELCA and LCMS congregations in Nebraska along with brochures and letters to the pastors informing them of Beta Sigma Psi. recruitment process.

The presentation offered practical advice that everyone could internalize and eventually use in order to stay above the competition. His goal was to get Beta Sigs to find out what was natural and what works to get recruits to start talking,

and eventually, get them interested in the fraternity.

"We have always known rush to be the "lifeblood" of the fraternity. Unfortunately, membership has recently

slipped at many of our flagship chapters. I think we have gotten away from placing accountability on individuals for recruitment performance. Active members just somehow thought it would happen? We are at a critical point in our fraternity's history. We either get good at rush or we will cease to exist," Studer said.

Studer also stressed how important it is to take the chance to say something when the opportunity presents itself. This is especially applicable in the way of dispelling myths and handling objections, which can often be difficult to do, but definitely not impossible.

To exemplify his main points, Studer set up mock recruitment situations using Beta Sigs in the scenarios. In the rush scenario, Hingst Award winner, Jarod Carl, Epsilon, Dave Lefevar, Iota, demonstrated how to handle some common objections like, 'My friends are thinking about renting a house, and I'll probably move in with them', or 'I don't think my parents

are keen on me moving into a fraternity since I've got to keep my grades up.'
Studer said the best way to handle these objections is to re-assure them that the intention of Beta Sigma Psi looks after their best interest because better individuals make a better house.

Studer encouraged brothers to plan out

their rush-calls before the call is made, and have the correct objective and use positioning statements to direct the flow of their conversation with the potential member.

"Use simple and open-ended questions. You want to avoid closed questions because that doesn't get them talking," he said. He added that when selling the fraternity to a recruit and his family, they have to be given the opportunity to be interested in it, and that can't happen if they're just answering yes and no questions.

"I thought it was a huge success to have so many great Beta Sigs all together. The topics we were discussing relative to rush are critical to the success of the fraternity on both a local and national scale. However, the real test will be how each chapter implements the ideas needed to move forward with aggressive rush strategies," Studer said.

In group discussions following Studer's presentation, National Recruitment Director, Cliff Ascher, spoke with each chapter's recruitment chairmen and highlighted some main points.

"Rush is the lifeblood of the house and

each of you are the sparkplug in your chapter. It's all about personal accountability and shared responsibility."

Brycen Meng, Zeta's Pledge Class President, said he learned more than he expected about recruitment.

"I learned how to make rush more of a selection process. It's important to know how to ask open-ended questions and really listen to the rushee," he said. Meng added that it was also critical to get recruits to the house, to show them around and meet the guys, because it's the guys actually in the house that sell it.

Wolters is also excited to see how MEF affects the future of Beta Sigma Psi. "I'm confident that those who attended will be more prepared and more able to be successful as they recruit new members. This will result in putting more, high quality men, in the chapter houses across the country," he said.

Baghdad International Airport (BIAP). On the way, we stopped by some of the

camps to check out what the locals were selling. They would sell about anything they could get their hands on. Some of

the camps had a specific place for the locals to sell at.

They would cram as many people as they could. "Mister, mister" they would all shout all vying for your attention. There was no bargaining if they saw your money. At BIAP, just south of Baghdad, we slept on the top deck of the departure parking lot. There was a herd of goats loose on one of the decks. It was good to see what the lower half of Iraq looked like.

After several months at Tallil, we headed back down to Kuwait. We spent the next three missions at APOD (Aerial Port), SPOD (Sea Port), and Camp Victory. It was nice to be back to something resembling civilization. We still don't have flushable toilets and usually run out of water at the showers, but we did upgrade from cots to bona fide mattresses. It's the simple creature comforts that keep us going.

Currently we are in our 11th month and time is slowing down. The closer the date gets to go home, the more anxious I get. There have been many hardships during this past year ranging from bad news from home, to personnel conflicts, and to false news of heading home. I keep asking myself if I would join the

reserves knowing what I do now. I don't think I will be able to answer that in the near future. It has been really hard

missing a lot of firsts with my wife, but I know that the work we are doing helps keep the terrorists from attacking us on our homeland and gives people a chance to turn in a new direction.

When finally home, I will probably

have to keep a generator running at night to be able to fall asleep. Constant loud noises have become a part of life. I have been trying to plan what I am going to do back as a civilian.

Catching up with family and friends will be a top priority. Finding a job can wait a couple of months -- I owe my wife a first anniversary.

I want to thank all of my family and friends for supporting me while over here. If it wasn't for them, I probably wouldn't have been able to make it this long.

God bless you and I hope to see you all soon.

6. Save some money. Even if you don't have it. Set it aside. Keep a couple of dollars in reserve. Don't spend everything in your pocket.

- 7. Then, give it away.
- 8. Call or email home once a week. Your mom will be thinking about you more than you know.
- 9. Write something every day. A journal. A letter. An email. A card. Class notes. The ability to write coherently is a powerful advantage in college. And people get better with practice.
- 10. Have fun! It's one basic reason we leave home to go to college. But set guidelines. Don't let your "fun" activities control your time. Computer games, par-

tying, TV, and hanging out can be enormous time wasters.

If you teach yourself time-management skills you are guaranteed a job upon graduation.

Tom concluded his letter by saying, "Please know there are legions of people who will help in times of need - even people you have not met.

As a person who shares a common fraternal bond with your dad, let me assure you that I stand ready to assist with any matter at any time."

I send my personal thanks to all who answered my plea for help in recruiting my son to be a Beta Sig. I thank many who sent cards but were not included in this article. My only thought is "Wow!" Beta Sigma Psi is truly a lifetime experience, not just for the college years. May


2004 National Educational Conference

2004 NIC Annual Meeting Report

The 2004 Annual Meeting of the North-American InterFraternity Conference (NIC) was held on April 25—26 at the Hilton Alexandria-Mark Center in Washington, D.C. Beta Sigma Psi was represented by Chad Pfister, Regional Vice President/NIC Delegate and Matt Walters, Executive Director.

The most important item to come out of the Annual Meeting was the passage of a set of Standards applicable to all member organizations of the NIC. This set of standards was developed over a period of 18 months and compiled from NIC member organizations, University/College Presidents, and Greek Advisors.

The goal of establishing member standards was to communicate a basic set of expectations, first to those that would choose to be members of the NIC and then to outside entities. By establishing and enforcing standards, the NIC is mirroring what each member organization does for and expects from its individual chapters and members.

The standards were drafted with simplicity, enforceability and measurability in mind. The standards will require that Member Organizations make the necessary changes to their Constitutions, By-Laws, and policies in order to be in compliance.

In addition, to passing a set of standards the House of Delegates also elected new members to the Board of Directors, along with the new President of the NIC, James Estes of Kappa Alpha Order.

In conjunction with the NIC Annual Meeting, a meeting was held on April 25 with representatives from the Smaller National Fraternities. It was decided at this short meeting that a more formal meeting be held in the Fall of 2004. This meeting will be held at the Headquarters of Triangle Fraternity in Indianapolis, IN on October 16—17. The focus of this meeting will be on ways that smaller National Fraternities can work together to improve the programs and services that they currently have for Active and Alumni members.


Standards Summary

- Member organizations to report data including community service hours, new members, initiates.
- Member organization policies will include: Agreeing to support open expansion and open recruitment on their respective campuses; Minimum GPA to become an associate member; Risk Management Policies, Alcohol Free Recruitment and Associate Member Programs.
- Member organizations will communicate its values through its ritual at least annually or as prescribed by its policies.
- Member organizations will communicate the importance of undergraduate members participating in educational programming.
