# Fraternity Bestows Honors On Brothers, Chapters

Although we didn't have a great number of submissions this year, the ones we did have were some of the best we have received in recent years. I hope that all of the chapters participate in next year's competition and the quality remains high and continues to improve.

Elsewhere in this edition of The Gold Rose are the write-ups for Keith Dierberg (Iota alumnus), recipient of the Lienemann Award; Lou Hencken (Mu alumnus), recipient of the Tiemann Award; Rupert Dunklau (Delta alumnus), recipient of the Tiemann Award; Stuart Baur, Ph.D. (Eta Chapter advisor), recipient of the Luther Award; and Ryan Thieme (Beta active), winner of this year's Erck Award competition. Please send your congratulations to these distinguished Beta Sigs.

The **Edwards Award** for excellence in Chapter Management was presented to **Epsilon** Chapter. Beta Chapter provided

an excellent and competitive submission. What captured the attention of the Awards Committee was the fine work in preparing the executive summaries for major areas of chapter activity and the summation statement. The quality of preparation was the high caliber observed and expected in a commercial business decision presentation.

The **Hingst Award** for outstanding scholarship attainment was provided to **Eta** Chapter. This was by far the most competitive of this year's awards. It was a toss-up, as Epsilon and Beta chapters reported above a 3.0chapter GPAs for the fall and spring, until Eta Chapter was able to report a 3.4 chapter GPA for the spring semester. This is believed to be the highest scholarship attainment in the history of the Fraternity. Well done, Eta!!!

The **Baehr Award** for best scrapbook was also in contention. The combined submissions of Epsilon and Beta were the

best ever in recent times, as both chapters leveraged current technology in preparing their visual record. **Beta** Chapter edged out Epsilon in a very close competition, with Beta Chapter continuing their marvelous work in publishing their scrapbook using a professional binding technique.


The **Founders' Cup** for membership education was again a close competition between Beta and Epsilon. The amount of educational programming for the entire membership in addition to a quality associate member education effort was a slight difference between the submissions, with **Epsilon** judged the winner. Both have strong programs and programming.

This year's **Welge Award** for recruitment was awarded to **Eta** Chapter. The awards committee hopes this becomes an intense competitive award after the focus on recruiting high quality Lutheran young men to our chapters continues in the upcoming years.

John E. Heidbreder, Eta alumnus, was selected for the Alumni Volunteer Service Award. John has volunteered a great amount of time and energy to organize, arrange and supervise plans for renovating Eta chapter's house. John has organized and executed a complete renovation of the basement and second floor, and he is still continuing to plan further renovations such as a new air conditioning system and a new roof. Come visit Eta chapter and see for yourself, as these improvements will help maintain a competitive position with the other fraternities and the dormitories. And better yet, help Eta Chapter alumni by making a contribution to their capital fund raising effort to make this happen!

Steven G. Liescheidt, Eta Alumnus, was selected for the Alumni Volunteer Service Award. Steve has volunteered to serve as the Rolla Alumni President and has reinvigorated their alumni in what has been termed the "re-birth" of Eta. Steve has also funded \$500 scholarships (\$1,000 a year) for first-year seminarians at LCMS and ELCA seminaries for the past two years. This scholarship has allowed

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## Keith Dierberg Selected as Lienemann Award Recipient

Keith Roger Dierberg attended the University of Missouri - Columbia, graduating in 1980 with a B.S.B.A. degree (Bachelor of Science Business Administration). During college, Keith actively participated in Iota Chapter activities, with primary emphasis as the Athletic Chairman. During those years, Keith coached Iota's intramural football team with unprecedented success and was the Iota coach at the 1980 Beta Sig National Basketball Tournament team when Delta Chapter hosted the event. Keith earned his MBA degree at Southern Illinois University - Edwardsville in 1981 and his DMgt. from Webster University, St. Louis in 2003. While at SIUE, Keith was inducted into Beta Gamma Sigma, a national scholastic honorary society that recognizes academic achievement in the study of business.

Keith served the Fraternity over the years in many capacities, primarily with the Educational Foundation. In the early 1980's, Keith served as Treasurer on the National Operating Board (now known as the National Board of Directors). When the Educational Foundation was created in 1983, Keith transitioned to the Educational Foundation, serving as Chairman from 1984 through 1988. Keith conceived the program of conducting the annual telethons in 1985, chairing this fund-raiser for several years. He prepared the initial training manual and a training video or the volunteers who manned the phones. Keith also assisted in preparing a marketing campaign to increase the number of contributors when the Educational Foundation applied for 503(c)3 status, important in allowing contributions to be tax deductible. This campaign of soliciting a \$1 donation from each Beta Sig resulted in over 1,100 members responding at that time, quite an achievement in 1985.

Keith returned to the Educational Foundation Board of Directors in 1999 and was elected as the Vice-Chairman. Keith became Chairman of the Educational Foundation in 2002 and continues to serve in this capacity. Over the years Keith has contributed in other ways, such as serving on the Awards Committee and he helped organize a Convention held in St. Louis.

Keith and his family are members of St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Des Peres, MO. Keith served on the Board of Elders for 11 of the 13 years during the period of 1989-2001, and has been Chairman of the Board of Elders since 2002. Prior to this, Keith and his wife Holly served as the primary Youth Counselors for Immanuel Lutheran Church in Olivette, MO for a few years in the early 1980's. Keith served on the Board of Directors for the Lutheran High School Association of St. Louis from 1992 to 1995. He served as Vice President of the Charitable Foundation Board of Directors for Lutheran Family

and has served on

Keith also served on the Board of Directors for the Make a Wish Foundation of St. Louis during the time St. Louis

gained "chapter status."

Keith's passion and conviction for the Fraternity are best stated in his eloquent remarks during the Long-Range Steering Committee deliberations in November 2002, "...we should be unapologetically Lutheran and unashamed of our Christian faith principles." After listening to his remarks that being a Lutheran Fraternity is what defines us and sets us apart from all other fraternities and should be advantageous to our recruiting efforts, the leadership of the fraternity decided to retain the Lutheran membership requirement as stated in the Constitution and move the Fraternity forward with an ambitious 5year plan.

Keith and his wife, Holly (a Pi Beta Phi alumnus from the University of Missouri – Columbia) and their 3 children, Emily, Jill and Ryan, reside at 1955 Windmoor Place, St. Louis, MO 63131. Keith is the Consumer Marketing Manager for Fleischmann's Yeast, with their Headquarters Office located in Fenton, Missouri.

Rupert Dunklau, a Delta Chapter alumnus, has been selected as a Tiemann Award recipient. Rupert is a retired business executive and philanthropist. His lifetime accomplishments are significant and numerous. In all of his activities, his faith principles are evident in the focus of his volunteerism and generous giving of his time, talents and treasure. Rupert is deserving of the tangible recognition provided by his selection as a Tiemann Award recipient and he joins a group of honorees that collectively represent the quality and number of highly accomplished alumni Beta Sigma Psi National Lutheran Fraternity is proud to claim as members and brothers.

Rupert graduated from St. Paul's Lutheran elementary school in 1941, Arlington High School in Arlington Nebraska in 1945 and the University of Nebraska with a BS degree in 1950. In Rupert's professional business career, he was promoted to Executive Vice-President and Director of Valmont Industries in Valley, Nebraska. Past civic activities include serving on the Board of Directors for the following organizations: Fremont Chamber of Commerce, Fremont Industrial Foundation, Fremont Area Community Foundation, YMCA, Morningside Community Association of Rancho Mirage CA; Co-Chairman of the Fremont United Way and member of the Omaha Country Club in Omaha NE.

Rupert's present church activities include member of Trinity Lutheran

Church in Fremont NE where he served as Past President and Elder among other offices, Board of Directors for Valparaiso University from 1977 to present, Board of Trustees for Lutheran Hour Ministries Foundation in St. Louis MO, and Board of Trustees at Midland Lutheran College Foundation in Fremont NE. Rupert's past church activities include National



Treasurer for Gamma Delta from 1948-1950, President & Treasurer of the NE District Walther League from 1949-1952, Board of Directors of Lutheran Family Service in Omaha from 1950-1966. Chairman - Board of Directors North Nebraska District of the LC-MS from 1951-1965, Ebenezer Thankoffering Chairman of the No. NE District in 1969, Board of Directors of the LC-MS from 1967-1975, Board of Directors of the Concordia Publishing House in St. Louis from 1969-1975, Board of Directors of the LC-MS Foundation from 1975-1985, Board of Directors for Midland Lutheran College and Member of the Executive Committee and Chairman of the Finance Committee from 1969-1994, Member Presidents Council of the C.T.C. in River Forest IL from 1969-1975, Board of Directors and Vice Chairman of Lutheran Tape Ministries, Board of Directors and Chairman of the Nebraska District Foundation Commission, Board of

Lutheran Family Services of Nebraska honored Rupert by naming the building that houses the LFS corporate offices and downtown counseling services as the Dunklau Building.

Rupert married Ruth Eggert and they were blessed with Paul and Janet and later four grandchildren. Ruth passed away in 1998. Rupert was remarried to Ruth King in 2000. 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# Ryan Thieme Selected | Kansas State University for 2004 Erck Award



# Honors Zeta Alumnus

Larry Erickson, Kansas State University professor of chemical engineering and faculty adviser for Zeta chapter, was honored this spring with the Commerce Bank Distinguished

Graduate Faculty Award for his research and years of teaching and mentoring students.

Larry, Zeta alumnus and past Lienemann award recipient, is director of the Great Plains/Rocky Mountain Hazardous Substance Research Center, and leads a 14-institution consortium that provides longand short-term environmental research related to key hazardous substance problems in the center's



geographic area. These problems include soil and ground water remediation, waste minimization and pollution prevention. The center, established in 1989 at K-State, is one of only five national U.S. Environmental Protection Agency centers for hazardous substance research.

Larry joined K-State in 1964 and was promoted to full professor in 1972, and has served as director of the center since 1989, and was director of the center's predecessor, the Office of Hazardous Waste Research, from 1985-89.

Larry also is director of the Department of Defense-funded Nonlethal Environmental Evaluation and Remediation Center, coordinator of the Urban Operations Environmental Laboratory and a leader of the National Science Foundation-sponsored Environmental Air Quality Group.

His work has been sponsored by nearly every major federal funding agency, including the National Science Foundation, the U.S. Departments of Defense, Energy and Agriculture, Environmental Protection Agency and NASA, as well as indus-

His most recent work, research on the beneficial use of vegetation in contaminated soil, known as phytoremediation, has been successful in several ways. It is estimated that his research has resulted in more than \$400 million being saved compared to conventional technologies because vegetation is being used beneficially at more than 50 contaminated sites where center professionals and graduates have provided knowledge to support plantbased remediation technologies.

In his nearly 40 years of service to the field of chemical engineering, Larry has co-authored more than 330 papers covering a wide range of topics. He also has co-authored chapters in six books. His professional memberships include Sigma Xi, Phi Kappa Phi, Tau Beta Pi and Sigma Xi honoraries; the American Institute of Chemical Engineers, where he was named a fellow in 2001; American Chemical Society; American Water Resources Association; and the Society of Fermentation Technology of Japan.

# Eclectic Educational Conference a Success

Paul stressed mainly the positive effect that peer accountability and review has had on the leadership quality at Triangle and the chapter leaders in attendance were excited to try the method in their chapters in the coming semester.

David Mayes of Phi Lambda Chi fraternity spoke on the process of year round on-campus recruitment. Phi Lambda Chi is similar in size to Beta Sigma Psi and on-campus recruitment accounts for a majority of the new members the fraternity. David suggested that chapters extend bids to recruits year round

Beta Sig national president Chad Pfister said the fraternity has been pursuing a relationship with Thrivent and its predecessors AAL and Lutheran Brotherhood in the past and can now look forward to more teamwork in the future. "It's an ideal relationship for the both of us because we're both organizations who want to make life better for Lutherans," he said. "We now have a base to communicate with Lutherans across the nation, and we also have the resources available from a Fortune 500 company."

Representatives in their area to find out

Financial Planning presentations, recruitment presentations, and help with local
service projects.

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# Dr. Stuart Baur recipient of the Luther Award

Stuart Baur, Ph.D., faculty advisor for Eta Chapter, is this year's Luther Award recipient for the national fraternity. Dr. Baur has been a professor at the University of Missouri-Rolla for two years and Eta Chapter faculty advisor for three semesters.

In this relatively short amount of time, he has built a bridge between Beta Sigma Psi and his church, Hope Lutheran Church. He has informed the chapter membership about projects the small congregation could not complete themselves and for which assistance would be appreciated. Eta Chapter has helped paint Hope Lutheran's new building and move pews to the new building from another church in the Rolla area. He encouraged Hope Lutheran members to hold Lent services at the Eta Chapter house, as the church did not have adequate facilities at that time. This was a great success, for both Hope Lutheran and the Eta Chapter.

Dr. Baur also arranged for the Fall 2003 Associate Member class to do their annual community service project. The associate members cleaned out a house the congregation was going to rent to college students. Dr. Baur was there and worked right along with the Eta associate members. Dr. Baur also helped with Eta Chapter's "Rajun Cajun" dinner by selling tickets at Hope Lutheran. Dr. Baur has also offered to tutor house members, although with a chapter GPA of 3.4 this has not been an urgent need.

This past March when one of the chapter sprinkler heads accidentally discharged he worked out the arrangements with the fire marshal and offered his home for the chapter members to stay since the house could not be used that weekend. Dr. Baur is an excellent faculty advisor and has helped Eta Chapter members involve themselves in a more active manner with the Lutheran community in Rolla.

# Beta Sig Campaigns For Illinois Supreme Court

Judge Lloyd Karmeier, Beta Sig alumnus from Alpha Chapter, is running as a Republican candidate in what is regarded as one of the most hotly contested judicial elections in U.S. history.

Featured in the Sept. 27, 2004 edition of *Business Week* magazine is Lloyd's race for a seat on the Illinois State Supreme Court. The cover story, titled 'The Battle Over The Courts,' highlights the race for the judicial seat due to the controversy over

tort law infamous in the southern Illinois district. *Business Week* calls the race "a surrogate for the furious national debate over tort reform."

In the article, Lloyd says of the nationally watched


In the article, Lloyd says of the nationally watched election, "This is not a political race, but we're being forced into the politics of it."

Prior to running for the Illinois State Supreme Court, Lloyd ran a private practice, served for 18 years as a circuit judge, and served a four-year term as State's Attorney of Washington County, Ill. He is also chairman of the Illinois Pattern Jury Instructions Criminal Committee, which makes recommendations about the instructions

given by judges to juries in criminal trials. In this race for the Supreme Court, he was rated "Highly Qualified" by the Judicial Evaluations Committee of the Illinois State Bar Association.

Lloyd has a long history of serving the fraternity since pledging to Alpha chapter at the University of Illinois in 1959 where he received both his undergraduate degree and law degree. He was president of his pledge class, chapter president and secretary. And in 1982, the Alpha Alumni chapter named him as the distinguished alumnus of the year. Lloyd also served on the Educational Foundation, where he was instrumental in earning 501C3 designation for the foundation.

### At-Large Lutheran Seminarian Scholarship Award Winning Essay

For two years now, Steve Liescheidt, an alumnus from Eta Chapter, has sponsored a \$500 scholarship for an "at-large" (or non-Beta Sig) first-year seminary student preparing to begin their studies for the ministry at a Lutheran seminary. Steve provided scholarships for one LCMS candidate and one ELCA candidate (\$1,000 each year), and also extended another scholarship opportunity to other Lutheran church bodies (i.e. AALC, WELS, etc.) but we didn't receive an essay submission to allow award of that scholarship. This scholarship program has allowed the National Fraternity several opportunities in an awareness campaign for Beta Sigma Psi National Lutheran Fraternity within the Lutheran church bodies.

If you are interested in continuing this opportunity of awareness exposure to the Lutheran church bodies, please send in a donation to the Educational Foundation marked for "at-large seminary scholarship campaign" as this was the last year that Steve carried the financial burden by himself.

One of this year's essays was submitted by Daniel J. Weber, a graduate of Concordia University – Irvine and a seminary candidate at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis. His essay was entitled "Breaking Through Limitations" and is provided as follows:

Lutheran pastors would be encouraged to volunteer as Pastoral Advisors in ministry at college and university campuses for new or existing chapters of Beta Sigma Psi National Lutheran Fraternity if they better understood what Beta Sigma Psi offers and represents. I've moved around quite a bit, and having a local Lutheran congregation has given me a great deal of stability. This is a personal example of the transcendence of the Gospel. Beta Sigma Psi is a way in which people can get connected so as to have this brotherhood, this unity, wherever life may take them. Having connections is such an important part of people's lives that any opportunity to develop these relationships ought to be explored.

People often ask what kind of pastor I'm going to be. It took me a few times

to truly understand what they meant. What those who pose such questions are getting after, is more specifically, where I will serve God's people and in what manner. I would ask for clarification, and they would rephrase to include comments like, "You know, like a campus pastor?... or in a parish?..." and similar ideas.

Beta Sigma Psi is a way that ordinary pastors could fulfill diverse passions and callings. At this point in my life, I do not know what God has in store for me in terms of where and in what capacity I will be serving in four, ten, or twenty years. But with an opportunity such as being a Pastoral Advisor for Beta Sigma Psi, I (and other pastors) would have the occasion to live out our callings in ways that might not have otherwise been available. What I mean by this is that in addition to the standard congregational work that most pastors have, there would be a healthy number of ordained men who would feel that they have the gifts and the passion to work the college students in a less full-time position than would be required of a campus pastor.

Support from Lutheran church administration leaders to assist Beta Sigma Psi National Lutheran Fraternity in membership recruitment can also be gained through education about the fraternity. Recruitment is sometimes difficult, but always a necessary task. This important responsibility can be done in conjunction with seminary recruitment. The different Lutheran churches have conventions and gatherings for their youth at various times every year. Most of these events have booths set up to offer information about the different Lutheran colleges and seminaries. This would be an ideal location to promote the fraternity. Many young adults feel that being active with the Lutheran church is important, but they do not know how to accomplish this goal. Maybe a prospective member is not feeling a call to be a pastor, but there are other opportunities available, and this is what an information booth or table would be able to share to a mass audience.

Another way to encourage church support in membership recruitment would be to focus on some of the understood limits of a congregation. Most congregations want to do more than they are able to do, in terms of reaching out to the community with God's saving grace. Beta Sigma Psi is an organization that is active in the community, and that is connected in ways that might be difficult for a congregation as a whole to be. This line of reasoning suggests to the churches that Beta Sigma Psi is an organization that is worthy of their support; one particular way of giving assistance would be to support membership recruitment.

Like connecting a seminarian with a pastor, it is both possible and important to see those who have gone ahead, and to see that life as a Lutheran can exist past confirmation. Beta Sigma Psi offers to be an extension to church youth programs and connected prospective members with current members can be a helpful part of this process. There is a fear among adults that sending their precious children off to a university might deprive them of what little religion they have. Beta Sigma Psi offers assurance to hesitant parents that their children will be looked after. Beta Sigma Psi shows that God is active at the university level, and that He had not abandoned His children.

Lutheran Churches can help promote and encourage Lutheran students to join Beta Sigma Psi Lutheran Fraternity. The strength and encouragement of those who share the same faith gives the support of unity. One fear of first-year undergraduate students is that they will have trouble connecting and making friends. This is especially the case with those students who travel far from home for their studies. I did my undergraduate work at Concordia University in Irvine, California. My family lived in Williamsburg, Virginia at the time. Not knowing anyone in California was an overwhelming thought, but at least I knew that I was attending a Lutheran school. Most Lutheran young adults do not attend a private Lutheran university and this is precisely where Beta Sigma Psi can be so important. The Fraternity provides a safe place where students can get plugged in to college life. At the same time, it can

# **Changed Forever: My Experience At UIFI**

From May 22-26 I had the opportunity to share in an amazing experience as part of the Delta Omega class of the Undergraduate Interfraternity Institute (UIFI) held at Indiana University. My UIFI session brought together 70+ fraternity and sorority leaders from across the country (and even one from Canada!). We each arrived with a common goal: to spend the next few days immersing ourselves in an environment that would hopefully foster a drive toward change for the better as Greek leaders. The lessons and experiences I had during those five days have left a lasting impression that I am excited to share in the fall upon return to Epsilon Chapter.

I arrived at our deluxe accommodations at the Alpha Xi Delta house on the first day unsure of what to expect. Within a couple hours I had made several friends and was much more comfortable thanks to a combination of icebreakers, team problem solving games, and the ever-popular UIFI Four Square. Yet at the end of the first day I was still unaware of the great impact the next few days would have on my development as a Greek leader.

Our time each day was composed of a few different types of gatherings. We would have large group discussions in which every UIFI attendee would take part. More intimate discussions where held in our ten person 'chapter' meetings. Each chapter was led by a couple of facilitators who became our main mentors through our time at UIFI. We would also have occasional self-reflection time to write out what was going through our minds. We usually would have recreation time in the afternoon and late evening before bed. It was during these late night, fun filled sessions of Trivial Pursuit and numerous card games that I would best come to know my fellow UIFI class.

I learned an exceptional amount from both the large and small group discussions. In the large group we discussed such topics as values-based action, encouraging the heart, and commitment to change for the common good. The small chapter meetings focused on building character through six pillars: trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring, and citizenship. Chapter meetings were also where we were able to really discuss the problems facing our home chapters in detail and at the same time support each other with suggestions for possible solutions. I grew close to most of the individuals in my chapter and am planning on keeping open communication through email in the coming months and years.

The first highlight of my UIFI experience occurred on the third day of the program. During the morning we embarked

on our 'Plunge Into the Streets' community service assignments. We were divided among several different service locations such as: a nature center, the Boys and Girls Club, a nursing home, and for my group's assignment: a homeless daytime shelter located at a local church. Upon first hearing my assignment I was a bit nervous, I had never worked closely with homeless people before and was a bit worried about my ability to relate to them. After arriving at the shelter, most of my group was assigned to preparing lunches. They also needed one person to supervise their computer lab where guests could come in and search for jobs on the Internet and type up resumes. Since I was somewhat knowledgeable of computers, I decided to volunteer. During the next three hours I assisted several guests in logging into the computers, a couple people in printing out information, and one particular middle-aged woman in developing a resume and applying to a few online jobs. There was no time or need to be nervous, as the steady stream of guests coming in were all looking for a friendly smile to greet them and would reward my helpfulness with surprisingly good manners and a very pleasant and thankful attitude. I left the shelter in the afternoon amazed at the courage and smiles I witnessed despite the hard luck the guests

were experiencing. My time at the shelter motivated me to serve my own community upon returning home. I also learned not to be too quick to judge people or situations of which I have little knowledge.

The second memorable occasion during UIFI took place on the evening of the third day when we had a mock debate. A few people were selected to be judges and the rest of us were split half and half, with one side to argue for the benefits of the Greek Community, and the other to argue against the Greek Community. At stake was the 'future' of the Greek Community. We alternated arguments with each person getting about thirty seconds to state his/her case. I was on the anti-Greek side and at first found it hard to argue against something that I really valued. However, after putting myself in the position of an outsider and listening to other's arguments, I found it sadly easy to make a long list of problems of how many outsiders view our Community. After the debate concluded, the judges recessed to discuss the 'future' of the Greek Community. Upon returning several minutes later they ruled against the pro side. This verdict was very shocking to us all, but made a lot of people (including myself) realize that without change, the national Greek Community could be heading for dark times ahead.

The final day we wrote down some of our personal goals for our respective organizations. I have four primary goals I would like to strive for at Beta Sigma Psi. First, I want to see members of Epsilon chapter be more willing and excited to participate in activities and commitments we will have in the coming year. Second, I want to see our chapter move into the top three in grades among Iowa State fraternities. I hope some new strategies I will employ this fall as Scholarship Chair will allow us to reach this accomplishment. Third, I want to encourage my Brothers to be more understanding of different viewpoints on an issue. In the past we have had communication breakdowns that lead to arguments in which nobody wins. Finally, I want to encourage our

continued faith based actions as Christian gentlemen and remain focused on our mission statement and foundation of Lutheran ideals. I know that the lessons I learned during my UIFI experience will go a long way in helping me reach my goals. In the words of one of our facilitators: 'to do nothing is NOT an option.'

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
