

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### President's Corner

Those words have never been more appropriate than they are today as I write this article. I am sure that I am not the first to say, nor the last to say, "Things are

going well with Beta Sigma Psi." Yes, we do have a few struggles, but overall things are good given the current state of affairs in the fraternal world. Do we have places to go? Yes! Do we have areas that need improvement? Of course! Can Beta Sigma Psi improve? You had better believe it!



Before I get into ways that the fraternity can grow in the future, let me fill you in on how the fraternity has already grown over the past year. During the Fall Semester 2004, I have had the pleasure to officiate over the Delta Colony Activation Ceremony and the New York Alumni Chapter Chartering Ceremony. In addition, Beta Sigma Psi is seeing efforts in the infant stage to recolonize at Texas A&M (Phi) and Nebraska-Kearny (Xi). Within the next 12 months, we should see groups at these campuses receiving official colony status with the fraternity.

While the National Fraternity has been working hard to expand the Fraternity to new campuses, our current chapters are experiencing growth and success, as well. Epsilon chapter (Iowa State) signed a whopping 23 Associate Members for the Fall Semester, which brought the chapter to almost full house capacity. Three chapters (Beta, Epsilon,

& Eta) finished in the Top 5 of grades on their respective campuses for the Winter Semester 2004. Epsilon and Zeta placed in the Top 3 of their respective homecoming competitions. Last, but not least, our chapters are actively participating in the activities of their local churches and cam-

pus ministries.

The National Board of Directors has also been working hard to improve the Fraternity and our chapters. So far this semester, each of our chapters has been visited by at least three different National Officers, with many of our chapters being visited by five or six different National Officers. This

is a great improvement and our National Officers are committed to keeping this level of commitment into the upcoming semester, and during the remainder of their terms of office. It is important that our chapters see the dedication that the Board has to the Fraternity through these visits. Therefore, the next time you see a National Officer, be sure to thank them for the time and hard work that they have put into Beta Sigma Psi during this semester.

One of the greatest areas we have grown is our relationship with Thrivent Financial for Lutherans. The National Fraternity has received financial support for our 2004 – 2005 Fiscal Year and will be receiving other support as well throughout the rest of the school year. This support includes presentations from a Senior Partner and Financial Associate at the upcoming Membership Education Forum at Purdue University in February.

# Educational Foundation Funds Fraternity Growth

The Beta Sigma Psi Educational Foundation ("BSPEF") is a 501(c)(3) organization that has been in existence since 1983. Funds are raised and managed in order to provide for educational instruction.

Historically, the greatest use of funds has been in the area of partial academic and needs-based scholarships to students at colleges and universities where Beta Sigma Psi has a chapter, a colony, or desires to have a campus presence.

As annual donations have grown and the endowment fund has grown (in excess of \$400,000), other worthy programs are being funded beyond the original primary emphasis on scholarships.

The BSPEF sponsors both a leadership academy and education forum, typically on an annual basis. Chapter membership manuals, officer manuals, advisor manuals, and recruitment seminars all regularly receive funding.

The BSPEF supervises a rather sizable endowment for the purpose of main-

taining designated funds in perpetuity, so that earnings from those funds may be used to sup-

port programs. Those individuals making large donations (\$100 or more) to the BSPEF often designate the gift, in whole or in part, to the endowment. Smaller donations and funds not so designated at the time the gift is made are deposited to

the BSPEF general fund.

Several sub-funds have been created within the endowment for larger contributions, including the following:: 1) Your Chapter 2) National Programs and 3) Scholarships.

If you are considering a donation, do consider the BSPEF giving groups.

# Beta Sig Elected To Illinois Supreme Court

Judge Lloyd Karmeeier, Beta Sig from Alpha chapter, made history in November when he was elected to the Illinois Supreme Court in what was widely regarded as one of the most contentious judicial races in history.

As the first Republican to be elected to the seat in 30 years, Lloyd defeated the Democratic opponent, Fifth Appellate Court Justice Gordon Maag, in a hotly contested and very exhaustive race that was a flashpoint in the battle over medical malpractice reform. Madison County, which is one of the 37 counties included in Illinois' Fifth Judicial District, has been the national topic of discussion for tort reform. Many of Lloyd's supporters argue that his election is a victory in retaining and restoring access to quality health care for Illinois, and that doctors have fled the area due to lawsuit abuse in the past.

After taking the oath to become the newest member of the seven-member court, Lloyd said that judges, the legal profession and the Illinois Legislature might be spurred to change the judicial election system because of the intense heat of the campaign, the St. Louis Post-Dispatch reported.

The election was also featured in the Sept. 27, 2004 edition of Business Week magazine. In the cover story, titled 'The Battle Over The Courts,' Business Week called the race "a surrogate for the furious national debate over tort reform."

And in a Jan. 5 speech in Madison County, President George W. Bush said tort reform is a key part of his second term agenda. Bush also made reference to Lloyd's victory, saying, "I believe the voters made their position clear on Election Day on medical liability reform."

#### Lloyd's Perspective

For 40 years, the judges in the Fifth District came from one of two counties - Madison and St. Clair, which was one of many challenges Lloyd had to confront.

"Some of the verdicts that came out of there, the publicity wasn't good," Lloyd said. "People wanted to get someone from another county."

Lloyd is from neither Madison nor St. Clair county - he hails from

Washington County, Ill. And at the same time, the region has long been a Democratic stronghold -Lloyd is a Republican. "I lost 20 years during the race," he joked.

The campaign was grueling, and many are calling it one of the biggest, most expensive judicial races in history. And now with the election over and with Lloyd now officially sworn in, he said he is

looking forward to the new challenge as being as judge on the Illinois Supreme Court.

Lloyd has a long history of service to the church, community and the fraternity. He's been a member of the Jaycees, the Lions Club, and the Washington County chapter for Red Cross, and he is an elder for his church.

As an active at Alpha Chapter at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, Lloyd served as secretary, president, and rush chairman. As an alumnus, he served as the alumni association's legal advisor and was instrumental in creating the Beta Sigma Psi Educational Foundation and earning it tax exempt status. He also served on the board of directors of the scholarship fund for 10 years. In 1982, the Alpha Alumni chapter named him as the distinguished alumnus of the year.

Incidentally, it was through two fraternity brothers he met in his early college years after pledging in 1959 that Lloyd was introduced to the legal profession. He started as an engineering major, but his path later changed after living in the fraternity.

"My first roommates were in pre-law.

That was obviously influential," he said.

After graduating from law school in 1964, Lloyd was appointed as a law clerk in the Illinois Supreme Court. He later joined a private law firm in Nashville, Ill., where he and his wife, Mary, have lived since their marriage in 1965. They are the parents of two children, and have four grandchildren.

Prior to winning the election to the Illinois Supreme Court, Lloyd served one term as State's Attorney of Washington County, Ill., from 1968 to 1972, and was elected Resident Circuit Judge of Washington County in 1986.

Looking back at his life with the Beta Sigma Psi, Lloyd said the fraternity taught him patience, tolerance, serving God and community, and "making sure you have the right perspective on what's important in your life."

# Lou Hencken Named Tiemann Award Recipient

Louis V. Hencken, a Mu Chapter alumnus and graduate of Eastern Illinois University, was presented the Tiemann Award after his keynote address at the 2004 National Convention Lienemann and Tiemann Award Luncheon. Lou is the President of Eastern Illinois University, serving in that capacity since November 2001.

Prior to being named as President of EIU, Lou served as Vice President for Student Affairs since 1992. Lou was an Education and Guidance & Counseling graduate of EIU and began his career in student affairs at Eastern as a graduate assistant and advanced through the housing ranks as a counselor and assistant and associate director, becoming the Director in 1975. In 1989, Lou was named Associate Vice President for Student Affairs, assuming responsibility for three new student affairs areas besides housing.

His duties continued to expand in 1992 when he was named Vice President for Student Affairs with responsibility for 19 student affairs areas employing 550 civil service and administrative employees and more than 1,500 student employees and a combined operating budget of \$50 million.

Lou is widely recognized by his colleagues in student affairs and has been honored for his work in the field. He has also been involved in university committee work dealing with affirmative action, undergraduate education, minority student recruitment and new administrative appointments. He has been President of the Sarah Bush Lincoln Center Board of Directors for the past four years and has also served on the Credit Union Board of Directors. In 2000, he was named Southwestern Illinois College's Outstanding Alumni.

Management of the endowment is the responsibility of the BSPEF board of directors, who have chosen to delegate specific investment practices to an Investment Manager. The board of directors evaluates investment performance annually, after a review of the financial statements.

The BSPEF board ultimately determines uses of the endowment proceeds. Grant request forms must be completed and submitted to the BSPEF in order for funding to be considered.

Travis Knight, Iota '98, was married and now works as a financial advisor for BKD Wealth Advisors, LLC, in Kansas City.




